

Street Furniture

Selby has areas of public space that have had both positive and negative pieces of furniture added over the years. There are features of character such as the iconic telephone and post boxes that should be retained, but even these historic features can be tired, damaged, and unused. Some elements of street furniture stand the test of time, but others are damaged and unused right from the start, if they are not planned into the character and purpose of the town centre.
